If you were to walk through Raybrook Estates II on a Tuesday afternoon, you might be blessed to hear the sounds of singing men echoing through the corridors. These men are a part of the Raybrook Singing Men, a group comprised of 25 male residents, led by Carol Peters. In December of 1997, Carol was asked to serve as the pianist for the group, and she willingly stepped into that role. When then-director Mark VanderArk faced health challenges. Carol stepped in to direct the men. Today, Carol notes, "I have been 'leading and guiding' them for 25 years and I've loved every minute of it." Together they meet and practice, then sing in Raybrook Chapel Services and hold regular concerts for

friends, family, and fellow residents. Following weekly rehearsals, you will

often find Carol having tea and sharing

memory of her mom, Margaret Herrema, who was murdered in 2005. Dorothy is one of a myriad of quilters from around the country who have made and donated quilts to MHC since 2007; over 4,000 quilts have been given as gifts of hope and comfort to so many hurting people, sometimes around the world and most often in our own community. Dorothy cheerfully describes Carol as "such a perfect person."

Carol's ties to Holland Home go back even further. She served as the administrative assistant in the Health Centers at Raybrook from November 1995 to May 2017. As a registered nurse, Carol was well qualified for this position and could use her gifts serving Raybrook's Independent Living residents while still having her

weekends free to serve in other ways, such as through church musicianship roles.

Decades ago, Carol also played the organ periodically for Fulton Manor Chapel Services. It was through this role that Carol's heart grew to lead her to financially support Holland Home.

Carol notes, "I remember the sweet little ladies at Fulton Manor as they would be in the chapel for services, and I knew that their resources would not necessarily last their lifetime. And as the cost of everything goes up, everyone needs a little help now and then."

Raybrook Singing Men member Roger Roskamp emotionally shared the following about Carol: "Carol picks out songs that have deep meaning to all of us. I recently heard two of the men say that they 'wake up in the

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morning, especially the day after practice, with music on their lips and in their minds.' The music we sing and community we share carries us for the week until we gather again."

Herb VanHassel, the longest serving member of the group, now at 20 years of singing under Carol's direction, commented, "She is one of the hardest working people I've ever been associated with. She puts so much time into selecting songs and prepping for services. Beyond that, she follows the needs of each of our members." The Raybrook Singing Men practices are a social event too. Herb noted, "For me and so many, this time is the bright spot of our weeks, a time not to be missed."

Honoring Dignity and Faith in Dementia Care: Mary McNeil's Journey

Mary McNeil, a former Holland Home Registered Nurse, devoted much of her career to caring for patients at Fulton Manor in the 1990s, many of whom were living with dementia. Later, she continued her service at Faith Hospice's Trillium Woods until 2006. While at Fulton Manor, Mary developed a special affinity for people living with dementia, seeing them not as defined by their illness, but as individuals with dignity and worth. Her compassionate approach was rooted in treating each person with respect, despite the challenges dementia presented.

Recently, Mary's passion for this work was rekindled when Rosemary, a staff member from the Dementia Institute, spoke at the Raybrook Care Committee about the Evening Star Worship Services which are tailored to meet the spiritual needs of individuals living with dementia - providing meaningful worship experiences designed to uplift and comfort.

Working alongside Chaplain Josh Baron, they provide a weekly Evening Star Ministry service. The ministry emphasizes creating an inclusive environment where those with dementia can engage with familiar hymns, prayers, and spiritual practices, often with family members who are encouraged to attend.

In addition, Mary continues to volunteer for Faith Hospice at the Raybrook campus, embodying her lifelong dedication to caring for those in need and offering them the gift of dignity, faith, and love.

Regarding the deep spiritual fulfillment she experiences in volunteering, Mary reflects, "Volunteering
